The year in review 2017

This annual report of the American Library in Paris covers activities and operations during 2017.

This was a year of significant transition in our Library team. After ten years at the helm of the Library, Director Charles Trueheart retired in August 2017. Charlie's decade of leadership dramatically changed the institution, both in terms of physical infrastructure and of orientation. Charlie oversaw the major renovation of the Library, which in summer 2016 transformed our space. He also broadened the outreach of the Library over the course of his tenure, significantly expanding our cultural and programmatic activities. This year also saw the retirement of Administrative and Financial Manager Hélène Wiesenfeld, a mainstay of the Library over many years. Both of these leaders contributed immensely to the progress of the Library.

An active home for the thoughtful and curious in Paris, the Library continued in 2017 to attract a wide English-speaking audience. Membership, and revenues from membership fees, both increased over the previous year.

The Library provided a wide range of high-quality services and programs, which proved particularly attractive for members and non-members alike. Our Evenings with an Author speaker series was a strong draw, with literary and journalistic figures like *The Atlantic*'s editor-in-chief Jeffrey Goldberg and Pulitzer Prize-winning novelists Colson Whitehead and Viet Thanh Nguyen bringing in standing-room-only crowds. Our Visiting Fellowship program continued to attract top-flight authors, and American Library in Paris Book Award winner David Bellos enthralled the audience at the award ceremony with a discussion of Victor Hugo's *Les Misérables*. Children and teens continued to be a major focus of Library attention, with our 2017 Halloween event being the largest we've ever organized.

All of these activities were only possible through the generosity of the donors listed at the end of this report. Some of those donors—most notably the Annenberg Foundation, the Florence Gould Foundation, and the Search Foundation—represent well-established institutions eager to support culture. Others are long-time friends of the Library or members of our active and dedicated Board of Trustees. And still others have chosen to remain anonymous. All are essential parts of our community.





Membership Revenues (2010 – 2017)







The American Library in Paris Book Award

Gifts from the Florence Gould Foundation made possible the creation of The American Library in Paris Book Award. The literary prize and a \$5,000 cash award go to the author of the most distinguished book of the year, written originally in English, whose subject matter is France and the French, or the longstanding and constantly evolving French-American encounter.

The Novel of the Century: The Extraordinary Adventure of Les Misérables, by David Bellos, was the winner of the fifth annual American Library in Paris Book Award. The Award jury was comprised of New Yorker staff writer Adam Gopnik, Pulitzer Prize-winning author Stacy Schiff, and former director of La Bibliothèque Nationale de France, Bruno Racine, who reviewed the shortlist selected by a dedicated team of screeners, listed below. Charles Trueheart, director of the American Library in Paris from 2007 to 2017 is now the Award's coordinator.

Gifts from The de Groot Foundation make possible the American Library in Paris Visiting Fellowship, consisting of a \$5,000 stipend for a writer or scholar desiring to deepen his or her research on a French-related topic with a month in Paris.

Visiting Fellows also speak to Library audiences, conduct workshops for Library members, consult with Library staff about its collections, and engage in the life of the Library community.

In 2017, its fifth year, the Visiting Fellowship went to Jacqueline Woodson, an award-winning writer of books for children and young adults and the recipient of the Margaret Edwards Award and the National Book Award, and James Verini, a magazine journalist who has reported for New York Times Magazine, National Geographic, The New Yorker, The Atavist Magazine, and others.

Past Visiting Fellows of the Library are Megan Mayhew Bergman, Anna Leahy and Douglas Dechow, Anthony Flint, Ta-Nehisi Coates, Susan Hiner, the late Alex Danchev, and Lan Samantha Chang.

Book groups and programs

Volunteer-led monthly book groups continued in 2017 to attract diverse and enthusiastic members, with returning groups discussing genres such as memoirs and mysteries; new books in French; Communist states and Eastern countries; life on the homefront in France, Germany, and the U.S. during WWII; the ongoing debates around the U.S. healthcare system; rock star memoirs; readings on the Middle East; international voices of the Library's evening programs; Shakespeare's plays; and more.

Book group leaders in 2017 were Laurie Calvet, Graciela Carrasco, Leslie de Galbert, Clydette de Groot, John Gridley, Janet Hulstrand, Marjorie Lallemand, Maurice Lanman, Mary Harries Magnusson, Philippe Mélot, Maureen Paget, Grant Rosenberg, Deborah Singleton, Morgan Thomas, and Ed Turner.

Library members were also offered workshops on wine, land art of the American Southwest, getting a French driver's license, a look at the making of Paris, along with a walking tour of American Revolution sites in Paris. These offerings were led, respectively, by Joshua Adler, Jane Weissman, Joe Start, Russell Kelley, and Mary Jo Padgett.

Children's and Teens' Services

The children's and teens' services department remains popular, with just over 50 percent of circulating items originating from the children's and teens' collections in 2017. With the addition of our new Teen Advisory Group, and the Toastmasters Youth Leadership Program (YLP) program, the Library hosted 92 teen events in 2017. Thanks to workshops from volunteers such as Laura Hershey (Young Writers Literary Club) and Munira Ebrahim (Baby Yoga) who worked with children's and teens' services manager Celeste Rhoads to provide new programs to complement the existing schedule of Story Hours, Saturday events for ages 6-10, children's book groups and Toddler Time storytimes, we hosted 179 events for children in 2017. That's a total of 271 events for children and teens!



Highlights of 2017:

- 1: The Library paired up with Toastmasters 75 to sponsor the Toastmasters Youth Leadership program a public speaking series for teens.
- 2: The Library hosted our first ever Zombie Fashion show for ages 12-adult as part of our annual Halloween Extravaganza.
- 3: Children and teens raised 350 euros for the Library during our 2017 Read-A-Thon.
- 4: The Library received over 500 original story submissions for the Young Authors Fiction Festival!
- 5: The Teen Advisory Group was launched to advise the children's and teens' services manager on new items for teen collections, with 10 founding members between the ages of 12 and 18.
- 6: Wednesday Story Hours were so popular that the afternoon sessions were moved to the lower level reading room to accommodate the 35+ children and parents in attendance each week.
