

Stanley Kubrick, director of Paths of Glory, Dr. Strangelove, 2001: A Space Odyssey, Barry Lyndon, The Shining and the forthcoming Eyes Wide Shut, is the world's most elusive film-maker. He lives in isolation, gives no interviews and works in complete secrecy. John Baxter,

author of the just-published biography of Kubrick, will discuss some of the challenges he encountered and present extracts from his recent BBC World Service Radio documentary Citizen K.
