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#### 2005 Gala Promises to be a Gastronomic Extravaganza

The American Library in Paris will commemorate its 85th anniversary on June 20 at a gala dinner to be held at the prestigious Hotel Bristol in Paris. In honor of the warm welcome always accorded the Library by the French people, this year's Gala will celebrate Gustave

Flaubert and his Norman origins and his devotion to its cuisine.

Presenting guest will be **Gonzague Saint Bris**, author of the sumptuous volume *L'education gourmande de Flaubert*, a culinary biography of the great writer that features recipes by **Eric Frechon**, chef de cuisine at the famous restaurant of the Hotel Bristol, a native Norman himself. Frechon's kitchen will serve up some of the delica-

cies featured in the pages of the lavishly illustrated tome.

This is the Library's premier fundraising event of the year! And it presents an unparalleled opportunity to help the Library continue to bring programs, great books, and online services to the Paris community, while enjoying what will be one of the most delectable

#### **EVENINGS WITH AN AUTHOR**

History, especially the history of World War II, is tremendously popular with ALP audiences. On March 23, Hal Vaughan read from his book Doctor to the Resistance. The large crowd hung on every word and kept him in the Library for nearly an hour of questions and answers. Thank you, Hal, for a fascinating evening!

In April, another speaker addressed an entirely different topic. On the 100th anniversary of the publication of *Peter Pan*, psychoanalyst Kathleen Kelley-Lainé discussed the psychological background of both the author and his principal character. In her tale of childhood sadness, Kelley-Lainé stressed the impact of loss in childhood and the lingering effects on the adult. She used parallels in her own life to illustrate her points, and again, her listeners were reluctant to see her leave—questions continued well past the normal time limit.

#### **Professor Kingsley Presents Art** of the American Southwest and Mexico

On March 9, artist and art teacher Brandt Kingsley provided a fascinating look at the religious symbolism in paintings and folk art from this region. Although strongly influenced by indigenous art, the trace of the Spanish conquerors was easy to see. Kingsley, who has lived in Paris for many years, taught art for "half a lifetime" at the American School (art. history of art, architecture), which he says is "really teaching creative thinking." He now teaches part time at Schiller University and paints in his studio in St. Cloud. Stop by and see his paintings in the Florence Gould space, as well as in the Dillon Reading Room.

During his early years in Paris, he was part of a group that coalesced around the writer James Baldwin, and at that same period, he was fortunate enough to visit with the Brecht family in East Berlin. He still travels widely, sometimes teaching courses in places like Quito, Ecuador. And he is also one of our most faithful Library users!

#### Top European Medical **Expert on Fertility to Speak** at ALP

Most of us remember the worldwide sensation caused by the birth of the first "test tube" baby, Louise Brown. Four years later, the first baby born via in vitro fertilization was born in France.

The physician in charge? Dr. René Frydman, who will be speaking at ALP on Wednesday, May 18, at 8:00 p.m. (20.00h).

Dr. Frydman is Head of the Dept. of Obstetrics, Gynecology and Reproductive Medicine at l'Hôpital Bichat in Clamart, and also heads a research unit. He has been a member of the Comité National des Droits de l'Homme and the Comité National Consultatif d'Ethique pour les Sciences de la Vie et de la Santé.

Dr. Frydman will speak in English: questions and answers will follow his talk and will be in either English or French.

With the toilet paper cleaned up, the partiers were free to wander from the juggling station, to the balloon animal area, and to the face-painting table.






An exciting WWII novel describing how commercial shippers helped the British Navy carry out many clandestine operations. The story starts in
