Covid-19 Update:


The new governmental anti-Covid measures closing large stores and shopping centers in France do not affect the Library. We remain open as follows for browsing, checkout, returns, and limited study space:

Join us as local favorite Stephen Clarke presents his latest novel, *The Spy Who Inspired Me*. It is April 1944, just before D-Day. A young woman spy, Margaux Lynd, has to go undercover into occupied France to find missing agents in the Resistance. Unfortunately she is lumbered with a male sidekick, a suave naval officer called Ian Lemming. He thinks occupied France is dirty and dangerous and wants to go back to his office in the Admiralty, but she has to drag him along while teaching him all the tricks of real wartime spy craft.


Evenings with an Author: Susan Herrmann Loomis


Evenings with an Author: Suzanne Nossel in conversation with Michelle Kuo

In *Dare To Speak*, Suzanne Nossel, a leading voice in support of free expression, delivers a vital, necessary guide to maintaining democratic debate that is open, free-wheeling, but at the same time respectful of the rich diversity of backgrounds and opinions in a changing country. Join us for an evening with Paul Richter as he introduces his new book, *The Ambassadors*, the story of a small circle of career U.S. Ambassadors who served as Washington's top troubleshooters in the greater Middle East in the tumultuous decade and a half after the 9/11 attacks. Thrust into war and upheaval, these diplomats took on far more than most envoys, organizing new governments, brokering political deals between warring blocs, and overseeing military operations. They served as another line of national defense, often at the risk of their own lives.


<u>Evenings with an Author: Fredrik Logevall in conversation with</u> <u>Charles Trueheart</u>

Tuesday 16 February at 19h30

Please join us for an evening of conversation with Dr. Fredrik Logevall about his latest book, *JFK: Coming of Age in the American Century*, 1917–1956, with an interview moderated by former Library Director Charles Trueheart. Fredrik Logevall is the Laurence D. Belfer Professor of International Affairs and professor of history at Harvard University. A specialist of U.S. foreign relations history and modern international history, he is the author or editor of nine books, including *Embers of War*, which won the 2013 Pulitzer Prize for History , the Francis Parkman Prize, and the 2013 American Library in Paris Book Award.


Evenings with an Author: Lilianne Milgrom

In her new novel, *L'Origine: The Secret Life of the World's most Erotic Masterpiece*, Lilianne Milgrom brings a fresh perspective to Gustave Courbet's infamous and contentious portrait of a woman's exposed torso and sex entitled *L'Origine du monde*, a painting that has drawn millions of visitors to the Musée d'Orsay. The book traces the extraordinary, clandestine odyssey of this iconic nineteenth-century painting that continues to scandalize all who set eyes upon it.


Evenings with an Author: Samuel Zipp

Dr. Samuel Zipp introduces *The Idealist: Wendell Willkie's Wartime Quest to Build One World.* This book dramatically details the 1942 plane journey undertaken by businessman-turned-maverick-internationalist Wendell Willkie to rally U.S. allies to the war effort. Willkie's tour of a planet shrunk by aviation and war inspired him to challenge Americans to fight a rising tide of nationalism at home. Samuel Zipp is a cultural and intellectual historian at Brown University and is also the author of *Manhattan Projects: The Rise and Fall of Urban Renewal in Cold War New York.*

Children's Book Awards: The American Library Association (ALA) announced the winners of the 2021 Youth Media Awards, including the Newbery Medal, Caldecott Medal, and Coretta Scott King Awards, via a virtual broadcast on 26 January. We Are Water Protectors by Michaela Goade and Carole Lindstrom won the Caldecott Medal for 2021, When You Trap a Tiger by Tae Keller won the Newbery Medal, and Before the Ever After by Jacqueline Woodson won the Coretta Scott King Author Award. These titles, along with the other award winners, are in our print collection, with several available on our eBook platforms.


Stars of Children's Literature: Black History Month

Awards for YA Literature Announced: At the 2021 Youth Media Awards on 26 January, the Michael L. Printz Award for Excellence in Young Adult Literature was awarded to Everything Sad is Untrue by Daniel Nayeri. The Morris YA Debut Award went to If These Wings Could Fly by Kyrie McCaulie. (Past Morris winner The Hate U Give, by Angie Thomas, remains one of the most-borrowed books in the Library's collection.)
