Introducing On the Road

The Library is happy to announce <u>On the Road</u>, a new cultural outreach program with the support of the US Embassy in France. The program is named after the popular book by Beatnik author Jack Kerouac. The French patron of the project is Rachid Santaki.

Over the summer and fall of 2022, American Library staff will go "on the road" on a library pop-up tour. They will travel to locations throughout the Ile-de-France and Hauts-de-France regions in partnership with libraries, museums, and centers for higher learning. Each two-day tour stop of *On the Road* will feature different American authors discussing a broad range of current issues with local public audiences on topics ranging from shared democratic values to climate change. Librarians will also share archival exhibits, perform bilingual Story Hours, and give hands-on demonstrations of digital resources.

On the Road began on 1 July at the Bibliothèque de l'Agglomération de Saint-Omer (Pas-de-Calais), kicking off with a public discussion in French about disinformation with American journalist Cole Stangler.

This coming weekend on 9 July, *On the Road* heads to Médiathèque Edouard Glissant in Le Blanc-Mesnil (93) in Ile-de-France, featuring a conversation, in French, with American journalist Madeleine Schwartz.




TONIGHT

Hybrid Event: In Person at the Library; Live on Zoom Tuesday 5 July at 19h30 CEST

Is virtual reality separate from reality? Are our experiences in virtual reality real? If everything is a simulation, does that mean that nothing is real? The answer to these questions, proposes philosopher David Chalmers in his work *Reality+*, lies in expanding our definition of what is real. Using an approach he labels as "technophilosophy", which uses new technology to answer questions in philosophy and vice versa, Chalmers offers a thorough and captivating argument for the reality of virtual worlds.

On Architecture (Pompidou Metz, Louis Vuitton Foundation) with Rahim Danto Barry


Hybrid Event: In Person at the Library; Live on Zoom Wednesday 6 July at 19h30 CEST

This conversation will be in French.

Architect Rahim Danto Barry will be speaking about his career in France and his book *Portes d'Afrique*. From the Centre Pompidou-Metz, to the Stade de France, to terminals of Charles de Gaulle airport, Barry has helped develop emblematic sites dedicated to sports, travel, and culture across France. He is an expert in movement, and his fascination with transit is expressed in his writing. *Portes d'Afrique* is both a rigorous study of doorways in African architecture, and a meditation upon heritage, culture, and identity.

Love and War with Lara Marlowe

Join Lara Marlowe, Paris-based foreign correspondent for the *Irish Times* newspaper, for a conversation on the war in Ukraine and her memoir *Love in a Time of War: My Years with Robert Fisk*. Described by Noam Chomsky as "A gripping tale of savagery and courage, of history in the making, intertwined with rich personal reminiscences," this account of her relationship with renowned British journalist Fisk describes the intensity of love and the perils of journalism, set against geopolitical turbulence and violent war.




A Bientôt, Jessie Hudson!
