The big year-end news from the Library is the announcement of a \$5,000 literary prize called the American Library in Paris Book Award.

A distinguished panel of judges from the
Library's Writers Council will select the most
distinguished English-language book of the year about
France or the French-American encounter. The 2013 Book
Award will be bestowed on the winning author at a special
prize ceremony in Paris next October. The Book Award is
made possible by a generous gift to the Library from the
Florence Gould Foundation.

figures. By superimposing the two elements together, they created an original piece of work that is part reality and part dreamscape.
