The Library opens its 2013 season of Evenings with an Author tomorrow night with Timothy Jay Smith presenting his harrowing tale of an American mercenary, sharpshooter and outlaw facing moral and mortal choices. Kirkus Reviews calls *Cooper's Promise* "literary dynamite" and named it one of the

best books of 2012. On <u>Wednesday 16 January</u>, the acclaimed French writer and commentator, **Philippe Labro**, speaks about some of the fifty notable Americans he has admired and captured in his new book of sharply-drawn portraits, *Mon Amérique*.

Teens, internet safety and social media will be explored by specialists **Elizabeth Milovidov** and **Samantha Woolfe** on Tuesday 22 January, followed the next night, Wednesday 23 January, by journalist **Kati Marton**. Her new book, *Paris: A Love Story*, tells of her marriages to the late Peter Jennings and the late Richard Holbrooke.

On Wednesday 30 January, please join us for a special evening surrounding the extraordinary life of Sylvia Beach, whose historic bookshop was the ancestor of today's Shakespeare and Company. We'll



run a short feature film, *Left Bank Bookseller*, with commentary by filmmaker **Lisa Reznik** and also hear from **Cynthia Morris**, author of a new novel called *Chasing Sylvia Beach*.


