The Library is delighted to announce the jury for the 2013 American Library in Paris Book Award: **Julian Barnes**, **Adam Gopnik** and **Diane Johnson**.

These distinguished authors, members of the Library's Writers Council, have in their fiction and nonfiction explored the broad themes of the new prize for the best book of the year in English about France or the French-American encounter.

A shortlist will be announced in June, and the winning author awarded the \$5,000 prize at a ceremony in Paris on Wednesday 16 October.


