Art on View: New World by Jeremy Massa Tuesday 9 July to Sunday 15 September



When Paris-based photographer Jeremy Massa visited New Zealand, a passage from the novel Ask the Dusk by John Fante came to his mind: "It was the absolute silence, nature completely indifferent to the city, desert under the streets and the road." That's when the idea for the exhibition New World became obvious. It had to be created in a spontaneous way without editing or preparing a vision of this country in clichés that might seem trivial, which could be used for postcards.

Massa wanted to transmit the truth of a country through which he was passing, far from the picture postcard bought in a shop during a trip. Join him on Monday <u>8 July</u> for a special evening as he talks about photography and the literary inspirations behind his New World exhibit.


Toddler Jamming KidJam offers




72-day trek along the famed path to the Spanish city of Santiago de Compostela.
