# Patricia Highsmith, forgotten expats and French food writing

Tomorrow night, Wednesday 1 October, author, playwright, and part-time Paris resident Joan Schenkar discusses her awardwinning book, The Talented Miss Highsmith: The Secret Life and Serious Art of Patricia Highsmith (a New York Times Notable Book and the definitive work on the Dark Lady of American Letters), in an evening of secret Paris histories and Schenkar's innovations in the art of biography.



On Wednesday 8 October, Nancy L. Green, professor of history at EHESS, presents her new book The Other Americans. It's all about the early and largely anonymous American expatriates in Paris from the Belle Epoque through the 1930s. The amazing stories she has unearthed speak to the expatriate experience as it was lived by the vast majority of Americans here, who were not writers and artists but rather

fortune seekers, entrepreneurs, aristocrats, lost souls, and the flotsam and jetsam of any expatriate enclave.

On Tuesday 14 October, Alexander Lobrano returns to the Library along with Clotilde Dusoulier, writer of the awardwinning blog Chocolate & Zucchini, to discuss their latest respective books, Hungry for France: Adventures for the Cook & Food Lover and Edible French: Tasty Expressions and Cultural Bites. This panel discussion will explore writing about food in France, reviewing restaurants and the different food movements in France now, picking up the thread from Patricia Wells and Ann Mah's
