









The American Library in Paris is excited to offer a new online research tool for kids and teens. The Library has just subscribed to World Book Online - a general reference website developed especially for younger library patrons. The site offers simple navigation, thousands of easy-to-read articles, multimedia, a biography center, and lots of games, interactive tools, and activities to help young library users discover accurate information quickly and develop online skills.



Library members can log in through the online catalog (click on E-Sources from the menu on the left or under the drop-down search menu). On <u>Wednesday 29 October</u>, the Library is pleased to have French writer Emmanuel Carrère on the occasion of the English language publication of *Limonov*, a portrait of an illustrious figure of 20th century Russia whose personal journey as a Soviet poet turned homeless essayist in New York to post-Soviet anti-hero, is stranger than fiction. Carrère, who has become one of the most heralded in the French



literary world for his use of autofiction, has been celebrated since the September release of his latest work, *Le Royaume*, about the history of Christianity and his own odyssey of faith. This event will be in the form of a conversation with programs manager Grant Rosenberg.

A year-long novel-writing workshop

Working on a novel? The Library is beginning a nine-part writing workshop from October to June, led by novelist Jessica Levine (author of *The Geometry of Love*), which will help get your written work further into shape. The monthly workshop will look at story structure and characterization, as well as stylistic issues. Participants will share plot summaries or outlines of their novels in progress as well as excerpts of their work. The



goal is to increase pacing and narrative tension so that the story has maximum momentum. Writers will send each other material a week before meetings and come prepared with constructive criticism.

Art on View - Occupy Portraits: New York City, 2011-2013

The Library is pleased to present a <u>new exhibit</u> entitled *Occupy Portraits: New York City, 2011-2013* featuring dramatic black and white photos by Victoria Schultz. A former documentary filmmaker, Schultz remembers the first time she met the people, in the name of Occupy Wall Street, who took over a park in lower Manhattan on 17 September 2011. She felt that something important was hapeneing and began taking portraits



of the activists using her large-format camera, creating a series of timeless images that document the early years of the Occupy Movement.
