Author encounters, talking to kids, and celebrity fashion

In honor of Martin Luther King, Jr.'s birthday, we have put together a reading list of books about King and the American civil rights movement to remind us about the importance of fighting for freedom and equality. The list includes historian Taylor Branch's epic three-volume biography on Martin Luther King, Jr. beginning with the Pulitzer Prize-winning *Parting the Waters: America in the King Years, 1954-1963*, which follows



the transition of King from young Southern minister to his triumphant March on

Washington.

There are books for young adults and children that tell the little-known story of thousands of African-American school children voluntarily marching into jail in *We've Got a Job: The 1963 Birmingham Children's March* and the superbly poetic and lyrical *Boycott Blues: How Rosa Parks Inspired a Nation*.
