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
The American Library in Paris is proud to offer its members an exciting new way to read their favorite magazines - and to explore the world of digital editions - through Zinio.

Zinio is an online platform that offers full-color, cover-to-cover, interactive digital magazines. Library members are now able to download and read complete editions of current issues of fourteen selected magazines with more to come as interest grows.



The magazines in the American Library in Paris collection are: Architectural Digest, Cook's Illustrated, The Economist, Golf Digest, Good Housekeeping, Harper's Bazaar, Macworld, Men's Health, National Geographic, The New York Review of Books, The New Yorker, Popular Science, Rolling Stone, and Vanity Fair.

As a member, you may access the Library e-magazine collection anywhere with an internet connection - the better the connection, the guicker the access. If you want to read the magazines on your tablet or smartphone, you will need to download the free Zinio app first. Once downloaded, issues can be read off-line, a great option for travelers.





Please let us know what you think of Zinio and our e-magazine collection, especially what else we might add to the offering. Don't forget that the Library still subscribes to nearly 100 paper-and-ink magazines which are located up front in our periodical section.

<u>Tomorrow night</u> is Ta-Nehisi Coates' final Library talk of his month-long visiting fellowship. He will read from and discuss his upcoming book which will be released next October. This long-form essay is his attempt to talk to his teenage son about the recent killings of Trayvon Martin, Jordan Davis, Eric Garner, Tamir Rice, and Michael Brown.

With a wink to Raymond Carver, next Tuesday's event is called "What We Write About When We Write about Paris." English-language novels set in Paris are a veritable genre of literature going back a century. This panel discussion features four Paris-based writers - David Benjamin, Meg Bortin, Debra Finerman, and E.J. Simon - answering the question of how to write well about Paris.



On Wednesday 11 February, author Vincent Giroud comes to discuss his book, *Nicolas Nabokov: A Life in Freedom and Music*, a biography about Nicolas Nabokov, Vladimir's lesser-known cousin. Nicolas Nabokov was a classical music composer who also happened to be a globe-trotting, high-level diplomat. The evening will be a conversation between Giroud and Nicolas' son Ivan Nabokoff, himself a renowned figure in the French publishing industry.

Brothers in Exile exhibit on view

In celebration of Black History Month, come and discover <u>Brothers in Exile</u>, an exhibit on display at the Library through 22 March 2015. Based on a play by Jake Lamar, the exhibit explores the intriguing triptych of three African-American writers - Richard Wright, James Baldwin and Chester Himes - who each decided to leave their homeland at a critical moment in its social history. They come to live in Paris in the 1950s



when the city was being shaken by the winds of the Cold War and the violent death throes of colonialism.

In conjunction with the *Brothers in Exile* exhibit, on <u>Tuesday 17 February</u>, join author and playwright Jake Lamar in conversation with curator Naida Culshaw as they explore the creative process behind his play.

Calling all young authors and readers!

The Library encourages young authors across the greater Paris area to sharpen their pencils (or put their fingers to the keyboard) and submit an original story to the <u>Young Authors Fiction Festival</u>, a city-wide writing initiative that aims to strengthen community through the art of storytelling. The YAFF is free of charge and open to all students ages 5-18 who write in English.
