In response to frequent suggestions from our members, especially our student members, as of March the Library is adding evening operating hours every Thursday from 19h00 to 22h00. The stacks and circulation desk will be open and the reading and conference rooms available for use as during the rest of the week. The Children's Library, Teen Mezzanine and basement will be closed; however books can be retrieved from



these areas upon request. This is an experiment through the month of June. If the response is positive, we will resume the Thursday *nocturnes* in September.
