







The Library will welcome two distinguished American novelists, Michael Chabon and Ayelet Waldman, as the guests of honor and speakers at the 2015 Gala Dinner on Tuesday 26 May at the Automobile Club de France on Place de la Concorde.

Word for Word performs Alice Munro

The Library is delighted to welcome back the celebrated San Francisco theater company that puts great American short stories on stage - word for word. Returning to Paris for the 20th year, Word for Word will perform two short stories by 2013 Nobel Prize winner Alice Munro: "The Office" and "Dolly"from Munro's first short story collection (Dance of the Happy Shades) and from her latest (Dear Life). These two stories



showcase the irony, humor, and surprise found in Munro's heroines.

The performances will be held at the Théâtre Adyar (a block from the Library) on Tuesday 5 May and Wednesday 6 May at 20h00. A special reception with the Word for Word cast and crew will follow the 5 May performance at the Library.

Mark Rothko, the Paris Commune and moving up to *collège*

French scholar, Annie Cohen-Solal returns to the Library tomorrow to discuss her new biography of the Russian immigrant who changed the American and international art world in *Mark Rothko: Toward the Light in the Chapel.* Cohen-Solal also will touch on her contributions to the new book *New York Mid-Century: 1945-1965*, which examines the cultural impact and legacy of the postwar art world in New York.



On Wednesday 8 April, the distinguished historian and author of the new book Massacre: The Life and Death of the Paris Commune, John Merriman, probes the high hopes and grisly repression of the urban revolt. He concludes: "If the Paris Commune of 1871 may be seen as the last of the 19th-century revolutions, the murderous, systematic, state repression that followed helped unleash the demons of the twentieth century."
