# 95 Years of the Library exhibit

The Library was founded on 20 May 1920 with a core collection of books donated by the American Library Association's Library War Service during the closing years of World War I. In celebration of the 95th anniversary of the Library, we are pleased to present a <u>special exhibit</u> (on display from 23 June to 5 September) featuring scenes from our remarkable history.




Highlights from the exhibit include: books bearing the Library War Service stamp; an architectural rendering of our Champs-Elysées location; a Dewey Decimal cataloging tool; books donated by Sylvia Beach's Shakespeare and Company; and books from our special and rare books collection signed by Langston Hughes, Ernest Hemingway, and Marlene Dietrich.



As our centennial year looms closer, we're thinking about ways to continue to record our extraordinary history. We are seeking memories and memorabilia of the Library from the 1950s to 1970s. In addition, we are looking for an experienced oral historian who will help us launch an oral history project.
