Popular speakers back at the Library

Many popular speakers return to the Library in the next two weeks as Susan Herrmann Loomis and David Downie come to talk about the pleasures of France, Chris Boïcos about 19th century and modern art, and John Morris on his WWII photography. All programs begin promptly at 19h30.

Loomis comes on <u>Tuesday 6 October</u> to talk about her new book *In a French Kitchen: Tales and Traditions of Everyday Home Cooking in France* focused on preparing meals from start to finish and what that means in the truest sense.

Downie speaks the following night, on <u>Wednesday 7 October</u>, about his book *A Passion for Paris: Romanticism and*

Romance in the City of Light, written from the point of view of a veteran resident and

travel guide of this city.

A MacArthur "genius" grant to **Ta-Nehisi Coates**

Congratulations to the winter 2015 Library Visiting Fellow, Ta-Nehisi Coates, for winning one of the coveted MacArthur Foundation "genius" awards on the strength of his extraordinary success with this year's most important American book, Between the World and Me.

Here's a provocative new interview with Coates by the Paris-

based Financial Times columnist Simon Kuper. His view: "The most radical aspect of Coates's work may be its lack of hope. He breaks with a longstanding American narrative: the arc of racial progress, the inevitable triumph of justice."

His first public reading of his book was at the Library on 4 February 2015, which you can see here.

Ignacio and the Mysterious Egg: A visit with illustrator Milkaya Laijah Saturday 3 October


