The jury, chaired by Auricchio, will consider a shortlist of books selected by a Parisbased screening committee during the late spring. The \$5,000 prize, supported by a gift from the Florence Gould Foundation, will be presented to the author of the winning book - the best of the year, in English, about France or the French-American experience - at a ceremony in Paris in November 2016.

Submissions for the 2016 Book Award are being accepted now, and a reduced entry fee is available for books submitted before 29 February. Details can be found on the Library website.

John Irving at the 2016 Gala Dinner

The Library is delighted to announce that John Irving, one of America's best-loved and best-selling novelists, will be the guest of honor at the 2016 Gala Dinner, this year on Tuesday 17 May 2016 at the Automobile Club de France.

John Irving is the author of fifteen novels, including The World According to Garp, The Cider House Rules, A Prayer for Owen

Meany, A Widow for One Year, and In One Person. His latest novel, Avenue of Mysteries, was published last fall.

Programs on forgotten black heroes, Proust as graphic novel, and a timeless love story

<u>Tonight</u> at 19h30, join author Linda Hervieux for a discussion of her book *Forgotten: The Untold Story of D-Day's Black Heroes, at Home and at War,* a military and social history that recounts the exploits of the 320th Barrage Balloon Battalion, a unit of African-American soldiers, that landed on the beaches of France on D-Day.

On <u>Wednesday 10 February</u> at 19h30, French illustrator Stéphane Heuet presents his graphic novel adaptation of Proust's masterwork, *In Search of Lost Time: Swann's Way* (translated by Arthur Goldhammer). Heuet will discuss the process of adapting such a book to the form of a graphic novel and the controversy around the endeavor when it first came out in France.

On <u>Wednesday 17 February</u> on 19h30, Sebastian Faulks, the 2012 Library gala speaker, presents his latest novel *Where My Heart Used to Beat*, about an English doctor who has seen the best and the worst of the twentieth century and is forced to confront the events that made up his life. The search takes us through the war in Italy in 1944 to the idealistic days of the 1960s and back into the trenches of the Western Front.

On <u>Saturday 20 February</u> at 14h00, join Gail Noyer, author of *Voltaire's Revolution: Writings from His Campaign to Free Laws from Religion* for a discussion on Voltaire and his relevance to the meaning of free speech today. RSVP to <u>rosenberg@americanlibraryinparis.org</u>.
