Bergman is associate director of Bennington College's MFA program and the author of two short story collections, *Birds of a Lesser Paradise* and *Almost Famous Women*. She will be speaking at the Library on <u>Wednesday 13</u> <u>April</u> about the critical need for artistic support for women in the Modernist era

# Spies, war, poetry, and Nabokov

<u>Tomorrow</u> at 19h30, join Andrew Lownie as he presents his book *Stalin's Englishman: The Lives of Guy Burgess* about the notorious Cambridge Five spy ring member.

On <u>Tuesday 22 March</u>, Anthony Lacoudre, the author of *L'incroyable Histoire des Mots Français en Anglais*, explores the historical context that gave 25,000 French words to the English language.

On <u>Wednesday 23 March</u>, seasoned international correspondent Janine di Giovanni, Middle East bureau chief for *Newsweek*, discusses her book, *The Morning They Came for Us: Dispatches from Syria*, which looks at how the war has affected ordinary people in the country. What emerges is an extracerdinary picture of the deveatating human concernance

Reading Roper, we feel anew the mountain breezes and the miles logged, the rich learning and the romantic mind behind some of Nabokov's most beloved book.

On <u>Saturday 9 April</u> at 19h30, join us for a panel discussion with Marc Aronson, Anne Chassagnol and Tioka Tokedira, moderated by children's and teens' services manager Celeste Rhoads. We'll look beyond the best-seller lists as these three panelists discuss how to seek out great children's literature and how to explore and discuss literature with children.

On <u>Saturday 16 April</u> at 10h30, join David Siefkin as he leads a practical workshop on how Wikipedia works. He will show participants how to contribute to existing articles, create new ones, and build a readership. Both experienced editors and those new to Wikipedia are welcome. 


In celebration of the opening of *Wasteland*, the Mona Bismarck American Center invites Library members to view the exhibition for free. Upon showing a valid Library
