From our Library Fellows

The Library is pleased to welcome our fall Visiting Fellows, Doug Dechow and Anna Leahy, who will be in residence for the month of October. We asked them to write short statements about the programs they will be doing at the Library.

Anna Leahy: "As a poet, I'm particularly interested in the ways that form and structure shape content and in the ways that subject matter may lead to particular choices about form. I plan to share some of my favorite work by poets such as Lucille Clifton, Dorianne Laux, and Nancy Kuhl, and to talk about the choices those poets made-consciously or unconsciously—in writing their poems. Participants in this



session will practice some of the constraints or techniques used in these published poems by drafting their own work."

Doug Dechow: "I'm a digital humanist who works, under a grant from the National Endowment for the Humanities, with the Center for American War Letters (CAWL) at Chapman University. This archive contains personal, war-related correspondences from the American Revolution through to emails sent from Iraq and Afghanistan. I plan to talk about how we accept donated materials, digitize these materials, and use



them to ask important questions. I'll share some of what I hope will come out of this project in the context of what digital can do for the humanities."



A poet's life, American socialites and redeemed flight
