"The Burdens of Brotherhood" wins the 2016 Library Book Award

Historian Ethan B. Katz's exploration of Jews and Muslims in North Africa who migrated to France in the 20th century, *The Burdens of Brotherhood*, has won the 2016 American Library in Paris Book Award.

The \$5,000 annual prize for the most distinguished Englishlanguage book about France was presented to the author last

Thursday evening at the George C. Marshall Center on place de la Concorde. The ceremony was attended by nearly 100 Library supporters.

Katz, an associate professor of history at the University of Cincinnati, spoke about the writing of the book and the prospects for eased tensions between these two communities in France. On <u>Tuesday 15 November</u>, the Library will be screening the documentary *Very Semi-Serious*, an offbeat meditation on humor, art, and the genius of the single panel. The film takes an unprecedented behind-the-scenes look at the *New Yorker,* and introduces the cartoon legends and hopefuls who create the iconic cartoons that have inspired, baffled - and occasionally pissed off - all of us for decades. The screening will be followed by a Q&A with director Leah Wolchok.

Workshop on writing plots and battling writers' block

Jessica Levine, who in 2014-15 led an academic year-long writing workshop, returns to the Library on Saturday 3 December at 14h00 to lead another one, this time a one-off that focuses on plots and subplots. Levine will discuss story structure and the ways in which a main plot can be enriched by subplots. The workshop will be limited to 10 people. Please come with 11 copies of your story idea or plot summary, which should be a maximum of 300 words.

There is still space left for the theatre workshop to battle writers' block led by American theater-maker and director Simón Adinia Hanukai on <u>Thursday 17 November</u> at 19h00. Participants will be guided through a variety of games and activities that will help expose them to a fresh new way of physically brainstorming ideas and generating content.

Read our magazines on Zinio

Over the last year Library members checked out over 3000 electronic magazines through Zinio. Two weekly classics, the *New Yorker* and the *Economist*, were by far our most popular, but the *New York Review of Books* and *Vanity Fair* weren't far behind. *National Geographic, Cook's Illustrated*, and *Good Housekeeping* were also favorites.



As a reminder, members may access Zinio initially through the Library catalog and then sync their accounts to an easy-to-use app on almost any device. New magazine issues arrive electronically often before the print version becomes available, and members may even set up automatic email alerts to let them know when new issues have hit the virtual stands. Library staff are always happy to help members discover and use e-resources on any device.
