Program highlights for early 2017

The first program of 2017 is on <u>Tuesday 10 January</u> when Chris Boïcos discusses the themes of the exhibition *The Color Line: African-American Artists and Segregation* on display at the Musée du Quai Branly - Jacques

Chirac. Boïcos explores the struggles and empowerment of African Americans through a stunning trove of books, posters, and paintings presented in the exhibition, which traces the origins of the "color line."



The following night, on <u>Wednesday 11 January</u>, we have a panel discussion about writing thrillers and mysteries with an international angle. It promises to be an evening to encounter new authors and also a practical look at how they plot, write, and how they came to be published. This panel features writers D-L Nelson, Angus Morrison, and Andrew Cairn.

On Wednesday 18 January, the celebrated author Hisham Matar speaks about his memoir detailing the search for his political dissident father years after he was abducted and turned over to Libyan security forces in *The Return: Fathers, Sons and the Land in Between.* The book is not so much about politics, but rather about family and love and loss. *The Return* was selected as one of the ten best books of 2016 by *The New York Times* book editors.



Join us on <u>Friday 20 January</u> at 18h00 for a broadcast in the Library reading room of the U.S. Presidential Inauguration as Donald J. Trump becomes the 45th president of the United States.
