# Sisterhood bonds, French country cooking, and Picasso's photographer

Tonight at 19h30, Sheila Kohler presents her memoir, *Once We Were Sisters*, which tells the story of her late sister's death at the hands of her husband who drove them off a road in Johannesburg. Kohler recounts the lives that she and her sister led with flashbacks to their childhood home and later being raised by their mother-at turns distant and suffocating. She evokes the bond of sisters and shows how that bond changes, but never breaks, even after death.

Tomorrow night at 19h30, Mimi Thorisson, author of the awardwinning blog Manger, talks about her second cookbook *French Country Cooking*, which recounts her family's move to an abandoned château in Médoc, where she meets the farmers and artisans who populate the village. Thorisson has created a cookbook to savor, featuring recipes inspired by her village in the vineyards including white asparagus soufflé, wine harvest pot au feu, and salted butter chocolate cake.

On <u>Tuesday 14 February</u>, eminent journalist Jeffrey Goldberg, recently appointed editor-in-chief of *The Atlantic*, will give a talk entitled "From the Obama Doctrine to the Trump Doctrine: What Role will American Play in the World?"

On <u>Wednesday 15 February</u>, filmmaker Marketa Tomanova screens her documentary film about the life of photographer André Villers, who, through his friendship as a young man with Pablo Picasso, took iconic images of some of the great cultural figures of the 20th century such as Chagall, Dali, Miró, Puñuel Fellini, Presedi, Castegu, Prévert, Cainabaura La

## New books our staff can't wait to read

Among the new books that will be on the shelves shortly are a few our staff members specifically requested. You may place a hold on any of these titles, but you won't be first in line!

*Fashion Plates: 150 Years of Style* by April Calahan is a highly illustrated trip through fashion history, before the invention of photography. Colorful plates from magazines dating from the

late 1700s to the early twentieth century show the evolution of style from dresses to wear to a ball at Versailles, to dresses suitable for dancing the Charleston in a steamy Parisian club.

<u>The Dark Forest</u> is Cixin Liu's eagerly anticipated sequel to *The Three-Body Problem*. This Chinese science fiction writer won the Hugo Award, and appeared on President Obama's recent reading list.

<u>A Really Good Day</u> is by our 2015 Gala speaker, Ayelet Waldman. This candid, and at times comic, memoir relates her experiment with microdoses of LSD in an effort to save her "mood, marriage, and life."

<u>Chow Chop Suey: Food and the Chinese American Journey</u> by culinary historian Anne Mendelson traces the history of Chinese immigrants to the US through the food that's now a staple of many American diets.

<u>The North Water</u> by Ian McGuire is the perfect read for this cold, grey season. Longlisted for the Man Booker Prize, this work of historical fiction promises to be a compelling, gruesome journey to the Arctic Circle aboard an ill-fated whaling ship.
