Jacqueline Woodson, artists' books, and postcards to the White House

Tomorrow night, spring Visiting Fellow Jacqueline Woodson will speak on race, culture, and sexual identity as part of her month-long residence at the Library. Woodson won the National Book Award for her memoir Brown Girl Dreaming, which also received the Coretta Scott King Award and Newbery Honor. Woodson will also do a reading and Q&A on Saturday 29 April at 17h00 for children (ages 8+) with teens

Centennial of the U.S. entry into WWI and the ALA Library War Service

With the centennial of the U.S. entry into WWI on 6 April 2017, the Library would also like to recognize the Library War Service of the American Library Association (ALA), whose books became the core collection of the newly established American Library in Paris a few years later. At the time of the signing of the Armistice, the ALA Library War Service had already shipped 1.5 million books for use of the American forces in the dozens of makeshift camp libraries throughout France.
