Speaking at the Library in May

<u>Tonight</u>, author Will Englund speaks about his book *March 1917: On the Brink of War and Revolution*, looking at Russia at the time, and connects it to the intrigue and geopolitics of today, one hundred years later and almost to the month.

<u>Tomorrow night</u>, Steve Faigenbaum will screen his documentary film *City of Dreams*, about the rise and fall of Detroit as one of the great industrial cities in the U.S. The trailer of the film can be seen <u>here</u>. A Q&A session with Faigenbaum will follow the screening.

On <u>Tuesday 9 May</u>, art historian Emmanuelle Day will present an art talk and presentation on the French sculptor Auguste Rodin, creator of some of the most famous sculptures including "The Kiss" and "The Thinker". Dubbed the "Michelangelo of France," Rodin's work is widely considered the turning point from ancient to modern sculpture. In her talk, Day will explore the themes of *Rodin: The Centennial Exhibition*, currently at the Grand Palais.

On <u>Wednesday 10 May</u>, Lindsey Tramuta, writer for the popular blog Lost in Cheeseland, will present *The New Paris: The People, Places, & Ideas Fueling a Movement*. Tramuta will explore ways the city is changing in the realms of food, wine, coffee, design, and more. She will be in conversation with *New Yorker* writer Lauren Collins on how Paris is catching up to the dynamism seen in other European and Northern American cities and beyond.



On <u>Tuesday 16 May</u>, join us for a panel discussion exploring the questions and decisions regarding the transition from primary school (primaire) to middle school (collège) for children and parents. The panelists will offer practical advice to prepare students for this next step in their education.


