Speaking at the Library in May

Tonight, join us for a panel discussion exploring the questions and decisions regarding the transition from primary school (primaire) to middle school (collège) for children and parents. The panelists will offer practical advice to prepare students for this next step in their education.

Tomorrow night, author Tatiana de Rosnay presents her biography of Daphne du Maurier, Manderley Forever. De Rosnay explores the life of the famed English playwright and novelist best known for the novel Rebecca. Spanning the 20th century, du Maurier led a fascinating life of art and literature within the English aristocracy. De Rosnay, with a novelist's eye and a biographer's pen, brings du Maurier to life once again, and endearing her to a new generation of fans.



On Tuesday 30 May, journalist James Kirchick presents his book, The End of Europe: Dictators, Demagogues, and the Coming of the Dark Age, exploring the rise of populism, Islamophobia and resurgent anti-Semitism, and the eroding cornerstones of liberal democracy in Europe.

On a special Monday 5 June at 19h30 event, join historian Chris Dickon as he talks about his book, A Rendezvous With Death: Alan Seeger in Poetry, At War, the first modern biography of the late American poet. The year 2016 marks the centennial of Seeger's death. His father, Charles Seeger, would become one of the founding supporters of the Library. Dickon will be joined by composer Patrick Zimmerli who will play musical excerpts from Alan Seeger: Instrument of Destiny.
