Kristin Scott Thomas, the Left Bank's postwar history, and a heralded novelist

Tonight's event with British-born, Oscar-nominated (and BAFTA-winning) actress Kristin Scott Thomas is already full. She will be in conversation with former New York Times European cultural correspondent Alan Riding about her career in film, cultural interests, acting in two languages, and more.

Tomorrow night, journalist and author Agnès Poirier will discuss her book Left Bank: Art. Passion and the Rebirth of Paris, 1940-1950, with NPR's Eleanor Beardsley. With engaging and entertaining prose, Poirier explores the illustrious history of this iconic Paris neighborhood and its colorful cast of artists, philosophers, and film stars including wonderful anecdotes about figures like Jean Cocteau, Marlon Brando, Miles Davis, and others.



On Monday 11 June, novelist Rachel Kushner will speak about her new book The Mars Room, about a woman in a California prison. Kushner is also the author of the bestselling novel *The* Flamethrowers, which was a finalist for the 2013 National Book Award and chosen as one of the five best books of the year by the New York Times. Her debut novel, Telex From Cuba, was a finalist for the 2008 National Book Award and winner of the Dayton Literary Peace Prize.



2018 American Library in Paris Book Award on display

With the entry deadline for our 2018 Book Award just behind us, more than 70 newly-published English-language titles about France or the French have been sent to the Library. The field this year includes books for adults, teens, and children, and represents a range of writing from fiction to history (passing through historical fiction, of course), with plenty of biographies, memoirs, and illustrated books for older and younger readers to round out the selection.

All the submissions have been added to the Library's <u>circulating collection</u>, and are on display in the Members' Lounge.

Our screening committee is reading through the eligible titles, and will present a shortlist to the jury in mid-July. The winner will be announced in November. More information about this year's nominations, and the jury, will be in the June issue of our quarterly newsletter, *Ex Libris*. The American Library in Paris <u>Book Award</u> is supported by generous funding from the Florence Gould Foundation.
