The Library's remaining evening programs

This event is now full. On <u>Tuesday 26 June</u>, the Library is pleased to collaborate with Ivy Plus European Leaders to present a panel discussion on "Artificial Intelligence and the Future of Humanity." Nguyen, himself a refugee, brings together a host of prominent writers from around the world to explore and illuminate their experiences. Featuring 20 original essays, the book is a powerful look at what it means to be forced to leave home and build a new one.

He will also lead a discussion on writing and publishing. There is a fee of 25€ to attend either session. Space is very limited.
