# 2018 American Library Book Award finalists

Five books have been shortlisted for the 2018 American Library in Paris Book Award, recognizing the most distinguished book of the year in English about France or the French: a biography of French statesman Charles de Gaulle, a portrait of the 19th-century photographic pioneer Nadar, a novel about two women who forged a singular path through interwar France and the Occupation, an exploration of Gaul in Caesar's
