
Fall programs at the Library

<u>Tonight</u>, award-winning British author and 2012 Gala speaker, Sebastian Faulks will discuss his new novel *Paris Echo*, about two strangers, an American postdoctoral researcher and a Moroccan teenager, who arrive in Paris and forge a connection when they meet by chance. With his signature dark humor, Faulks has written a deeply urgent and thoughtful book about grievance, identity, and how we choose to live our lives.



On <u>Wednesday 3 October</u>, author, former U.S. Navy senior chief petty officer, and frequent NBC and MSNBC commentator Malcolm Nance will speak about his book *The Plot to Destroy Democracy*. This event is full.

On <u>Tuesday 9 October</u>, Peter Sokolowski returns to the Library to talk about the "war of the dictionaries" and the making of Webster's landmark 1864 edition. The change from the idiosyncratic work of one individual to the organized effort of a team set the course for Merriam-Webster's editorial and business practices to this day. Their decisions also marked an important moment in the development of modern lexicography.


Tickets for our annual Halloween Extravaganza will go on sale

Library Visting Fellows win the Dayton Literary Peace Award

Two Library Visiting Fellows received the 2018 Dayton Literary Peace Award. Hala Alyan won the prize for fiction for her debut novel *Salt Houses*, a poignant tale that follows three generations of a Palestinian family displaced by one military clash after another. Alyan is the Library's Visiting Fellow for the fall and she will speak at the Library about her novel-inprogress *The Arsonists' City* on Wednesday 10 October at 19h30.

Ta-Nehisi Coates won the prize for non-fiction for *We Were Eight Years in Power*, an exploration of race and identity during the Obama administration.

Coates was the Library's 2015 Winter Visiting Fellow, when he read from the final draft of *Between the World and Me* for the first time to an audience.
