

Library events: Gilets Jaunes, the Energy Crisis, and Arts Advocacy

Members of the American Library in Paris are avid readers. And although reading is a solitary activity (unless you're reading out loud to rapt listeners), there are many ways to enage with others at the Library. Our evening events this month highlight the climate and political challenges we face.


On <u>Tuesday 22 January</u>, the Library will host a panel discussion on the Gilets Jaunes movement, inequality, and the future of politics in France with journalists Sophie Peder (*The Economist*), Adam Nossiter (*The New York Times*), Marc-Olivier Bherer (*Le Monde*), and moderated by Karina Piser (*Institute of Current World Affairs*).

On <u>Wednesday 23 January</u>, Thierry Lequerc will discuss, in French, the challenges of energy today and offer insights on mass-solutions in "Energy Chaos: Is There a Way Out?" in partnership with MIT Club de France and INSEAD Energy Club.

On <u>Tuesday 29 January</u>, Chinese British author and filmmaker Xiaolu Guo will be in conversation with programs coordinator Catherine Olien about her autobiography *Nine Continents: A Memoir In and Out of China*. On <u>Wednesday 30 January</u>, writer, playwright, and filmmaker Alan Govenar will talk about the career and life of Anne Morgan, who co-founded the Committee for Devastated France (CARD) with physician Anne Murray Dike.

Apply now for the Visiting Fellowship



The Library is now accepting applications for Fall 2019 and Spring 2020 Visiting Fellows.

The fellowship offers writers and researchers an opportunity to pursue a creative project in Paris for a month or longer while participating actively in the life of the American Library. Applicants should be working on a book project, fiction or non-fiction, or a feature-length documentary film, that contributes to cross-cultural discourse. Particular attention will be paid to an applicant's ability to offer the Library community a variety of opportunities for exploring a topic. In addition to the stipend, the Library will connect the fellow to resources and individuals in Paris that could be helpful to his

or her project. The fellowship is open to all nationalities, though the proposed project must be in English.

January Culture Picks by Mike Duffy



This month's Culture Picks by volunteer Mike Duffy highlight two very different 19th century approaches to life along with an exhibition tracing 5,000 years of art and design in Latin America. The art-for-art's sake, mystical loner Fernand Khnopff is featured in a comprehensive show at the Petit Palais, while the Nadars, a family of entrepreneurial, technical experimenters in photography, appear in an outstanding presentation at the Bibliothèque Nationale François Mitterrand. At the Fondation Cartier, *Southern Geometries* brings a wide range of artworks, from several thousand years ago to several weeks ago, including pottery, painting, prints, textiles and more all employing geometric designs in a lively, cheerful, color filled display.

From Conflict to Collaboration workshop for parents

Do you ever feel frustrated with your child/teen? Find yourself shouting and imposing consequences in reaction to challenging behavior but it doesn't often work? Imagine having a simple framework that guides you in every parenting challenge and brings out the best in both you and your child. On <u>Saturday 2 February</u> at 16h30, join parenting coach Karen Kraut for an overview of the Collaborative Problem Solving approach, which gives parents concrete tools to relate better to their kids, reduce their challenging behavior, and build their skills in self-regulation, communication and problem-solving.

Participants of this workshop may sign up for a three-part follow-up series of workshops with Karen on Wednesdays 6, 13, and 20 February from 18h30-20h30. This workshop is recommended for parents of children and teens ages 3-18. <u>Sign-up is required</u>.
