A special note from the Director about Notre Dame

The expressions of loss, disbelief, and solidarity we have witnessed in the hours after the Notre Dame fire have reminded us how important the cultural heritage of Paris is to the global community. Indeed, its <code>patrimoine</code>—both concrete and intangible—has an incredible hold on our minds and hearts. Even those of us who might not have stepped foot in the vast interiors of the Gothic cathedral know it through centuries-old stories. In a sense, those stories, like Paris, belong to everyone. At the Library we have been moved by messages about the tragedy sent from readers around the world. For us, this is a call to never take for granted our shared cultural heritage nor take lightly the task of its preservation.

Children's Events (ages 0-12)



Film screening of Frederick Wiseman's Ex Libris



On Thursday 2 May at 18hoo, the Library will host a film screening of Frederick Wiseman's 2017 documentary *Ex Libris: The New York Public Library* in partnership with Météore Films. Wiseman's film goes behind the scenes of one of the greatest knowledge institutions in the world and reveals it as a place of welcome, cultural exchange, and learning. Wiseman is widely regarded as one of today's greatest living documentary filmmakers. His newest film, *Monrovia*, *Indiana*, will be in French cinemas beginning 24 April. The film screening of *Ex Libris* is free for Library members and non-members can attend by purchasing a day pass.
