
Doors open at 19h00 for evening events, which begin promptly at 19h30.

Reading 2019 Gala honoree Martin Amis



The Library's <u>2019 Gala Dinner</u> honoree and keynote speaker is renowned novelist, essayist, and cultural commentator Martin Amis. As the author of fourteen novels, several collections of short stories, two screenplays, and eight collections of nonfiction, Amis has established himself as one



of the great writers of our time. Amis is best known for his London trilogy, published in the 1980s and 1990s: *Money: A Suicide Note, London Fields*, and *The Information*. As a nonfiction writer, Amis has explored a range of topics including politics, pop culture, sports, and literature. We've chosen a selection of his fiction, non-fiction, and selected



Hope College students research the Janet Flanner archives



The Library recently welcomed a team of researchers from Hope College as part of a Paris Stories/Mellon Grand Challenges project. The team included Hannah Jones, an English and women's/gender studies major and Aine O'Connor, an English and history major. The subject of their work focused on the Library's rare book collection of Janet Flanner (1892-1978), a long-time writer for *The New Yorker*.
