This month's Culture Picks by volunteer Mike Duffy present sharply contrasting artistic visions of domestic interiors and the outdoors in the works of late 19th-century French artists (*The Nabis and Decor: Bonnard, Vuillard, Maurice Denis...* at Musée du Luxembourg) and a Danish contemporary of theirs (*Hammershøi: The Master of Danish Painting* at Musée Jacquemart-André). As the summer begins, contemporary Japan provides an engaging game-like experience for children (*Monsters, Manga and Murakami* at Le Musée en Herbe), a fantasy life outside of homes and gardens. # **European travel spotlight: Portugal**



When we hear about Portugal, the first things that comes to mind are the beautiful cities of Lisbon and Porto. But Portugal is much more than these two cities. There is the sea with beautiful beaches (Costa Vicentina), mountains (Serra da Estrela), and the countryside (Serra do Gerês). The food is very good and affordable, and the people are very friendly (and do not worry, they also speak English!). We've selected a variety of travel guides, books by the best-known Portuguese authors (Fernando Pessoa, Camões, and José Saramago, who received the 1998 Nobel Prize in Literature), and books on the history of one of the oldest countries in Europe. All books are displayed in the Members' Lounge and can be checked out.
