Library Visiting Fellow Rhae Lynn Barnes



Lynn Barnes, Assistant Professor of American Cultural History at Princeton University, and specialist on the globalization of American popular culture and racism. While at the Library, Rhae Lynn will complete her first book, Darkology: When the American Dream Wore Blackface, which maps the political, economic, and global cultural geography of amateur blackface minstrelsy. She will also conduct research for a new edition of the Image of the Black in Western Art series. Rhae Lynn will speak at the Library on Wednesday 3 July and conduct a writing workshop on Thursday 11 July.

Workshops on writing and getting unstuck



On <u>Saturday 29 June</u>, returning workshop leader **Susan Tiberghien** will explore how writers go in and out of darkness to find their stories. On <u>Thursday 4 July</u>, **Leslie-Ann Murray** will lead a generative writing workshop where participants will be given free-writing prompts to help emerging writers get unstuck. On <u>Thursday 11 July</u>, **Visiting Fellow Rhae Lynn Barnes** will show how visual literacy, observational skills, and photography can transform



your writing.

The 2019 Young Authors Fiction Festival culminated with a celebration event on Friday 14 June at the Library that was attended by over 200 people, including the young author finalists, parents, and teachers. Each finalist was awarded a certificate and a personalized bookmark with a comment from a judge who read their story. This year we received a recordbreaking 841 entries from 50 schools and writing classes located in and around Paris. The Library thanks the 94 judges who volunteered their expertise to read all the stories and choose the winners, as well as the stellar volunteer 2019 YAFF organizing committee.
