









**Evening events: Craig Carlson's Pancakes in Paris and a conversation with Rebecca Makkai...** 

<u>Craig Carlson</u>, owner of local restaurant Breakfast in America, will present his NYT bestselling book, *Pancakes in Paris* (10 Dec), which tells the humorous story of his adventures as a small business owner in France. Craig's talk will be followed by a book sale and signing- with free pancakes for all!

Rebecca Makkai (11 Dec), who will be speaking with Daniel Levin Becker about her latest book, The Great Believers, which was a finalist for the National Book Award and Pulitzer Prize. The novel, set between Chicago and Paris, tells stories of those affected by the AIDS epidemic of the 1980's.

<u>David Chaffetz</u> will be in conversation with Celestine Bohlen (17 Dec) about his latest book, *Three Asian Divas: Women, Art and Culture in Shiraz, Dehli and Yangzhou*.
