Building the Future, Reader by Reader

This month kicks off the Library's centennial year. To celebrate this historic anniverary, we're thrilled to announce an expansion of the Children's and Teens' Library.

Since the Library's 2016 renovation, membership, foot traffic, program attendance, and book circulation have boomed. The Children's and Teens' Library in particular is busier than ever with over 5,000 children and teens attending 292 programs in 2019 alone. Over the past two years, Library staff and trustees have been gathering feedback from users of all ages about how they use the Library and what their dream library would offer. Again and again, young users said that what they most want is a great collection of


books; a quiet, comfortable, inspiring space to read; and room for group study and collaboration. Architect Lia Kiladis will be unveiling final plans soon and construction will begin in spring 2020.




The Library will expand into an adjacent space and increase its total footprint by 70 m² on the ground floor and mezzanine. In the upgraded Children's and Teens' Library, there will be dedicated spaces for each age range and ample space for our most popular events. The Teen Mezzanine will double in size. In addition, we will also be building an additional conference room on the mezzanine that can be used for book groups, teen workshops, and group study.

This expansion is the capstone of <u>Project 100</u>, the Library's ongoing centennial capital campaign, which has raised close to 800,000 € thanks to our dedicated supporters and Board of Trustees. As part of Project 100, we will also be refreshing the print collection, improving technological infrastructure, and strengthening the endowment.

Her award-winning, acclaimed debut novel, *The Hate U Give*, is a #1 *New York Times* bestseller and a major motion picture. Her second novel, *On the Come Up*, was released in 2019. No sign-up is required for this event, and seating is available on a first-come, first-served basis.

Are you a fan of fantasy? Want to meet other fantasy readers? Join our new YA Fantasy Book Club while spots are still available. The Youth Leadership Program will resume on Friday 10 January, the Teen Writing Group will meet this Saturday from 17h00-18h30 and the Master Shot Film Club will meet on Saturday 18 January. The aforementioned clubs are full, but teens who are interested in applying for clubs should stay tuned; applications will be accepted this spring for fall 2020. Teens ages 12-18 can meet other bookworms and English-speakers in Paris at one of our many Friday night Teen Nights. Register in advance to attend our Locked in the Library program on Friday 24 January and our Flash Fiction workshop with Jane Mobille on Friday 31 January. Limited space is available for Teen Nights, so sign up early. Register for our Teens Explore Literature program on Saturday 25 January, and learn about "The Lagoon" by Joseph Conrad.



Children's Events (Ages 0-12)

Kick off the new year by meeting other families and book-lovers at our Library's annual Winter Wonderland, Saturday 18 January at 14h00. Sign-up is required. Suitable for all ages, the event will feature games, crafts, a performance by local musician Matt Black, and a visit from Frosty the Snowman. Story Hours resume this week, rain, shine, or strike, with two sessions on Wednesday at 10h30 (in the Children's Library) and again at 14h30 (on the Lower Level). No advance sign-up is required. Our next Thursday Toddler Times for ages 1-3 will be held on 9 January and 23 January. There are two sessions each Thursday, at 10h30 and 17h00. Registration is required for each individual session. Saturday afternoon drop-in events for ages 6-10, at 15h00, include a program on 11 January in partnership with Gifted in France all about your amazing brain; poetry on 25 January; and live storytelling with guest Sylvie Mombo on 1 February. Children between the ages of 9-12 are invited to a workshop on Research Skills on Sunday 19 January. If you have five minutes, take some time to tell us about how you use the Children's Library, and what you'd like more of from this department.
