National Youth Poet Laureate and Writer-in-Residence Amanda Gorman: A special teen writing workshop



Virtual writing workshop and Q&A: National Youth Poet Laureate Amanda Gorman (ages 12-18)*

Join us for a very special virtual writing workshop, just for teens. During this interactive event, Amanda Gorman will guide participants in a poetry exercise, then answer questions about her work. Participants will be required to provide their own writing materials.

*This event is strictly limited to participants ages 12-18.

About Amanda:

At 22, Amanda Gorman is heralded as "the next great figure in American poetry." Amanda made history in 2017 by being named the first ever National Youth Poet Laureate of the United States. Born and raised in Los Angeles, she is a recent graduate of Harvard, where she studied Sociology.

Since publishing the poetry collection *The One for Whom Food Is Not Enough* at 16, her writing has won her invitations to the Obama White House and to perform for Lin-Manuel Miranda, Al Gore, Secretary Hillary Clinton, Malala Yousafzai, and others. Amanda has performed 4th of July and Thanksgiving poems for CBS, and she has spoken at events and venues across the US, including the Library of Congress and Lincoln Center.

We're pleased to host Amanda as the Library's virtual <u>Writer-in-Residence</u> for the summer. Amanda had been invited as the summer 2020 Writer-in-Residence, and while she can't be at the Library in person this year, she has graciously offered to present this virtual event. We look forward to welcoming her to Paris when that is possible.



Young Authors Fiction Festival winners announced



This year, the Library's Young Authors Fiction Festival (YAFF) received 630 entries, written by children from fifty schools and writing classes in and around Paris. We congratulate all who participated.

YAFF 2020 culminated in two virtual celebration events on Friday 12 June. The celebrations included the announcement of the winners (see full list), comments from the judges, and readings of one of the finalists' stories in each grade. Over 200 people attended, including the young author finalists, parents, teachers, and Library volunteers who judged for the festival. We look forward to YAFF 2021. Until then... happy writing!
