(FULL)Evening with an Author: Lindsey Tramuta in conversation with Thomas Chatterton Williams
Wednesday 1 July at 17h via Zoom

Please join us for a conversation between Lindsey Tramuta and Thomas Chatterton Williams as they speak about her much-anticipated book, *The New Parisienne*. Lifting the veil on the mythologized Parisian woman—white, lithe, ever-fashionable—Lindsey's work demystifies this oversimplified archetype and recasts the women of Paris as they truly are, in all their complexity. Featuring fifty activists, creators, educators, visionaries, and disruptors—such as Leïla Slimani, Lauren Bastide, and Mayor Anne Hidalgo—the book reveals Paris as a blossoming cultural center of feminine power.

His main characters: Celebrated modernist architect Mies van der Rohe and friend-cum-patron Doctor Edith Farnsworth. Alex will present his extensive research, reflections on the legacies and personalities of the twentieth century's architectural "giants," and thoughts on the difference between creating and actually living with (and within) daring design and architecture.




Writing Workshop with Anissa Bouziane Thursday 9 July at 17h via Zoom



New Podcast Episode

"Cause of Death: COVID-19, Police Violence, or Racism? A Conversation about Racial Inequalities in France and the United States"

In the latest episode of the Library's podcast, *Evenings with* an *Author*, Inès Seddiki interviews Dr. Jean Beaman about her research, including her book, *Citizen Outsider: Children of North African Immigrants in France*.

Dr. Beaman then poses questions to Ms. Seddiki about her organization, GHETT'UP. Finally, the two discuss racism in France more broadly regarding COVID-19 and police violence. They also offered their thoughts and perspectives on the recent protests in France for Adama Traoré and in support of the Black Lives Matter movement.
