



Evening with an Author: Mamta Chaudhry in conversation with Russell Banks

Wednesday 16 September at 19h30 via Zoom

Mamta Chaudhry's debut novel, *Haunting Paris*, is set in Paris in 1989. A timeless story of love and loss, *Haunting Paris* matches emotional intensity with lyrical storytelling to explore grief, family secrets, and the undeniable power of memory. For her virtual evening at the Library, Mamta will be in conversation with Russell Banks, author of *Cloudsplitter* and *Continental Drift*, and twice a finalist for the Pulitzer Prize.

Please join us for an evening with Dr. Clara Oropeza, author of *Anaïs Nin: A Myth of Her Own*, which traces Nin's literary craft by following the intimacy of self-exploration and poetic expression attained in the details of the quotidian, transfigured into fiction. By digging into the mythic tropes that permeate both her literary diaries and fiction, this book demonstrates that Nin constructed a mythic method of her own, revealing the extensive possibilities of an opulent feminine psyche.
