# **Presenting** Critical Conversations

Dear Library supporter,

We are thrilled to announce the launch of a new program at the Library. *Critical Conversations* is an expert-led discussion series that will allow Library members to delve deeper into pressing topics. We believe open debate is vital to a healthy democracy, and the aim of these series is to foster a sense of community while also promoting civic discourse and engagement. Our hope is that participants will join us to educate and challenge themselves—through reading and dialogue.

We are kicking off the program in November with the timely issue of "Race in America" led by Dr. Tarani Merriweather, who holds a PhD in Social-Organizational Psychology from Columbia University in New York. Dr. Merriweather's academic research and teaching applies an intersectional lens to the study of gender and leadership. *Critical Conversations* participants will attend a series of three sessions, ninety minutes each, and will be furnished with short readings in advance. Dr. Merriweather will open each session with a brief lecture, then guide a group discussion. The pilot series will be held virtually over Zoom, so Library members can join us from all over the world. Series size will be capped at thirty participants to encourage meaningful participation across the group.

*Critical Conversations* grew out of the Library's Strategic Planning process and is generously underwritten by the Heather and Robert Keane Family Foundation. We heard feedback from you that you wanted more opportunities for continuing education and more occasions to meet and exchange with fellow readers. 
