

Wednesday 6 January

This special panel, moderated by journalist Christine Finn and featuring technology experts Nicholas Hall and Mike Cassidy, will explore and debate the issues surrounding technology and its ethics. They will cover the state of tech from the year 2000, before and after the dot com bubble burst, through the era of startups, the beginnings of social media and apps as a means to connect and make life simpler, and finally to our present worries about social media leaving us vulnerable and divided. Evenings with an Author: Rachel Mesch

Tuesday 12 January

Please join us for an evening with Dr. Rachel Mesch as she introduces her book *Before Trans: Three Gender Stories in Nineteenth-Century France*, which examines the lives and writings of three French writers whose gender expression did not conform to nineteenth-century notions of femininity. Jane Dieulafoy, Rachilde, and Marc de Montifaud established themselves as fixtures in the literary world of *fin-de-siècle* Paris at the same time as French writers, scientists, and doctors were becoming increasingly fascinated with sexuality and sexual difference. *Before Trans* explores these three figures' lifelong efforts to articulate a sense of selfhood that did not precisely align with the conventional gender roles of their day.
