## Book Award 2023

Five titles have been selected as finalists for the 2023 American Library in Paris Book Award

2023 American Library in Paris Book Award The American Library's \$5,000 literary prize, now celebrating its eleventh year, is given to a title originally published in English that best realizes new and intellectually significant ideas about France, the French people, or encounters with French culture. Sixty-three titles were submitted this year by authors, publishers, and others across the English-speaking world. All sixty-three nominees for the 2023 Book Award are listed in these pages and are in the Library's circulating collection.

The winner, announced at an invitation-only ceremony in November 2023, will be selected by an independent jury, this year consisting of Lauren Groff (chair), Doan Bui, and Sudhir Hazareesingh.

The Book Award is supported by generous funding from the Florence Gould Foundation.
