We reopen on Tuesday 18 July with reduced summer hours:

Sundays and Mondays: CLOSED

Tuesdays and Wednesdays: 13h00-19h00

Thursdays, Fridays, and Saturdays: 10h00-16h00

We return to our regular hours on Tuesday 29 August.
