## **Book Award Winner Katherine J. Chen Returns**



Katherine J. Chen won the 2023 American Library in Paris Book last November for her fictional retelling of the life of Joan of Arc, *Joan: A Novel*. The book combines meticulous research with imaginative storytelling, bringing her main character to life and offering a nuanced exploration of faith, power, and gender dynamics in medieval France.

Chen returns to the Library on 9 April for an Evenings with an Author conversation with medieval scholar Patricia Dailey, an Associate Professor at Columbia University and currently a Faculty Visitor at the Institute for Ideas & Imagination in Paris. The talk is free and open to the public.

Chen will also be leading a two-part writing workshop on 11 and 13 April. This seminar-like discussion is for those interested in fiction and creative nonfiction, and participants are encouraged, but not required, to submit an excerpt of a current writing project when registering. 40€ for members and 60€ for nonmembers.

## **Reverberations Review**

Last week we marked the culmination Reverberations, our first-ever music festival celebrating innovations in the musical arts, and the musicality inherent in literature.

This month-long series of conversations, performances, and workshops included a concert by Composer-in-Residence Nia Imani Franklin, incorporating opera, spirituals, jazz, and original pieces. Our first Cultural Fellows, composer Missy Mazzoli and librettist Royce Vavrek, presented their past operatic collaborations, and we learned about their upcoming production at the Metropolitan Opera. In a roundtable discussion, Franklin, Vavrek, and Mazzoli considered their roles as change makers in opera, and shared the importance of advocacy and engagement in the contemporary arts.





As we brought song into the Florence Gould Reading Room, we also discussed the musical aspects of poetry and prose. Selby Schwartz presented her debut novel, *After Sappho*, which twists the device of the Greek Chorus by giving voice to a collective female "we." Poet and prose fiction writer Vanessa Onwuemezi shared her thoughts on style, rhythm, and musicality in her writing. Patricia Lockwood, the spring 2024 Writer-in-Residence, led a workshop exploring the sounds and voices of short-form writing, from social media, to poetry, to "three line novels."


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



### **Brown Diaspora: An Evening with Moon Charania**




#### Charles Trueheart presents Diplomats at War



The submission period for the Young Authors Fiction Festival closed on 1 April. Over 1,000 short stories were sent in by children and teens from all over France, with the participation of over sixty-five schools. What's next for the contest entries?

The short stories will soon arrive in the hands of over 140 volunteer judges. Each entry will be read and evaluated by at least three separate judges before the finalists are chosen.

YAFF culminates in a Celebration Event at the American Library in Paris on Friday 14 June 2024. All participants, their parents and teachers, and YAFF judges are invited to attend the ceremony, where the top five stories in each grade level will be announced.

Each finalists' story will be published in the YAFF Celebration Booklet, which will be available for purchase from the Library during the Celebration Event and will join our permanent circulating collection.


