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Summer Hours and Other News



Summer Hours begin on **Monday 15 July 2024 and continue through Monday 26 August 2024**, inclusive. We'll remain open all summer long, including during the Games.

Closures: We'll be closed all day on Bastille Day, Sunday **14 July**; the day of the Olympic Games Opening Ceremony, Friday **26 July**; and Assumption, Thursday **15 August**.

Custom Due Dates: If you're traveling and need a few extra days with your summer reading, ask the Member Services team about adjusting your due dates to fit your holiday schedule.

Lending Policy During the Games: No books will be due between 14 July and 15 August, and no overdue fines will accrue during the Games. Fines accrued before/after this period will still be due.

History Tours: Our free Friday history talks continue through 19 July. After a summer break, we'll be offering our Tours again starting on Friday 23 August at 11hoo. September dates will be added to the calendar in late July. <u>Click</u> to see available dates, and to register.

Getting to the Library during the Games

During July and August, we encourage you to check information about public transportation, vehicle and pedestrian access, and zone restrictions regularly; regulations may change over the course of the Games.

Getting to the Library during the Games

From July 18 to July 26, at 1 p.m

The Library will be in the Red Zone during the week leading up to the Opening Ceremonies. Motor vehicle access is restricted, but pedestrians and bicyclists are permitted. Please note that the Library is very close to the grey "SILT" security perimeter (sécurité intérieure et lutte contre le terrorisme). To enter SILT zones, pedestrians, cyclists, and drivers must apply in advance for a digital Games Pass. A Pass is not granted to individuals who only need to cross through a SILT zone. Therefore, it may be impossible for members to reach the Library this week using their usual route.

Opening Ceremony: July 26

The Library will be closed on the day of the Opening Ceremony. Staff will be available by email during our regular summer hours.

During the Games: 26 July-11 August

The Library will be in the Blue Zone throughout the Games, meaning that motor vehicle access will be regulated, but pedestrians and bicyclists are permitted. As the Library is in close proximity to several venues, accessing our facility may prove difficult during certain sporting events.

The Paralympic Games: 28 August-8 September

The Library will be in the Blue Zone throughout the Paralympic Games, meaning that motor vehicle access will be regulated but pedestrians and bicyclists are permitted.
