#### EXPANDING HORIZONS FOR THE AMERICAN LIBRARY IN PARIS



We are thrilled to unveil *Vision 2027*, a three-year strategic plan that will shape the Library's future and expand our cultural outreach through 2027. This plan has been made possible by a historic gift from the American Center for Art and Culture, whose mission to foster Franco-American cultural exchange has been a cornerstone of the Parisian cultural landscape for decades.

In December 2022, the American Center announced it would be winding down its activities, with the proceeds from the sale of its *hôtel particulier* in Paris to be donated to the American Library. This transformative gift ensures that the Center's legacy of artistic collaboration and cultural dialogue between France and the United States will live on through the Library's expanded programming, creative initiatives, and cultural exchanges.

The key elements of *Vision 2027* are centered around four streams of action: Illuminate, Champion, Empower, and Ignite. Each of these streams is designed to deepen the Library's engagement with local and global cultural communities, foster meaningful cultural exchanges, and broaden access to our diverse resources and services.



ILLUMINATE

#### **Bringing History to Light**

The ILLUMINATE stream aims to make history more accessible and engaging through the expansion of the Library's successful History Tours, the introduction of new physical and digital exhibits, such as the history of the Library War Service in WWI, and the digitization of its institutional archives. This stream highlights the intersection of historical research with modern cultural perspectives.



CHAMPION

#### **Fostering Cultural Dialogues**

With the CHAMPION initiative, the Library will broaden its cultural programming by growing its Cultural Fellowships, hosting multidisciplinary events, and extending partnerships with leading cultural institutions in France. These programs will encourage creative and intellectual exchanges across literature and the arts. Jill Le Grand, Chair of the Board of Trustees, noted, "A transformative gift from the American Center for Art and Culture will allow us to build upon the Library's legacy as a hub of connection and discovery, enabling us to reach an even wider audience via partnerships with cultural institutions and make an even greater impact with enriching, multidisciplinary events."

#### **Building Bridges of Knowledge**

The EMPOWER stream focuses on increasing access to the Library's resources, building on its program On the Road to reach underserved communities in and out of Paris. A new courier service will ensure that members across Paris can access its resources more easily, extending crosscultural educational opportunities and fostering knowledge-sharing between diverse communities.

## Igniting Curiosity, Fueling Creativity

Through the IGNITE stream, the Library will nurture a culture of lifelong learning and creativity by increasing access to its most popular print and digital titles and by acquiring key digital resources that are important to American history in Paris. Plans also include developing a librarian exchange program to facilitate international collaboration and expanding the Young Authors Fiction Festival to support the next generation of writers.

"As we approach our 105th anniversary, *Vision 2027* is the perfect way to begin a new chapter for the Library," says Audrey Chapuis, Executive Director of the Library. "We're excited to broaden our programming, expand access to knowledge, and directly support writers and artists with new fellowships."

#### A New Season of Critical Conversations



Sign up for Critical Conversations: The Internet Is Not What You Think

Starting on Thursday 10 October Professor and historian **Justin Smith-Ruiu** will uncover what the internet really is.

During the sixth season of Critical Conversations, we'll be exploring the historical, political, and philosophical forces that shaped early information networks, and how these early visions compare to the internet of today. In this thought-provoking series of conversations, we'll unravel the impact of this unprecedented technological revolution on our economy, politics, culture, and even our psychology. Delve into the minds of the great thinkers who theorized about machine intelligence and the utopian—or dystopian—future of a world driven by machine-aided decision making.

The 2024–2025 series will unfold over eight sessions, from October 2024 to June 2025. Conversations will begin at 19h00 CET and run for ninety minutes, in person at the Library. Professor Smith-Ruiu will begin each meeting with opening remarks, before guiding a group discussion on the topic at hand.



# Film Screening: Migrant's Death Valley In-Person at the Library only Tuesday 17 September at 19h30 CEST

Known as the "migrant's Death Valley" for its desolate landscape and unforgiving heat, Brooks County, Texas is believed to have the highest death toll for migrants anywhere in America, although the vast majority of bodies are hidden in unmarked graves and never identified. The documentary follows a forensic anthropologist and a team of students as they seek to identify bodies and contact families. Join us for a conversation with documentarian **Lisa Molomot**, **Sara Abbas**, and **Asma Zalim** to see clips from the film.




#### Populism in 2024



Psychoanalyst **Jamieson Webster** discusses her forthcoming book *On Breathing: Care in a Time of Catastrophe.* The one thing that unites every single moment of our lives is that we are breathing. Although inhaling and exhaling rarely attract attention, these simple actions are increasingly under threat—whether due to climate change, anxiety, or a public health emergency. Webster draws on her professional experience as a palliative care psychoanalyst during the pandemic, as well her personal experiences, to explore this often overlooked subject. The conversation will be moderated by writer, journalist and psychoanalyst **Sinziana Ravini**.

**Festival America: Women's Bodies** Offsite: In-Person at Festival America


Thursday 26 September at 16hoo CEST


Does Grief Ever End? With Cody Delistraty and Lindsey Tramuta

Cody Delistraty lost his mother to cancer when he was in his early 20s. As he explored ways to mediate his grief, the American Psychological Association and World Health Organization announced a diagnosis: Prolonged Grief Disorder. While this diagnosis allowed for novel treatment, Delistraty was left with a question: Should we treat grief medically? Delistraty appears in conversation with Parisbased writer and travel journalist Lindsey Tramuta.

# Illustrating Exile with Edel Rodriguez Hybrid: In-Person at the Library or Live on Zoom Wednesday 2 October at 19h30 CEST


Hailed for his iconic art on the cover of Time and dubbed "America's illustrator-in-chief" (Fast Company), **Edel Rodriguez** is among the most prominent political artists of our age. When Rodriguez was nine, Fidel Castro announced his surprising decision to let 125,000 traitors of the revolution, or "worms," leave Cuba. Before they could leave, his family was imprisoned and then marched to a flotilla that miraculously deposited them, overnight, in Florida. *Worm* recounts the coming-of-age of an artist and activist, who, witnessing America's turn from democracy to extremism, struggles to differentiate his adoptive country from the dictatorship he fled. This conversation will be moderated by artist, designer, and educator, **Maria Krasinski.**

## The Ethics of Blame With Miranda Fricker and Amanda Dennis


Hybrid: In-Person at the Library or Live on Zoom **Tuesday 8 October at 19h30 CEST**

How is it being used in processes of truth and reconciliation in South America and in supporting women survivors to come forward and tell their stories? How does unequal access to conceptual language enable some people to tell their stories, while others suffer without knowing how to put names to their experiences? **Miranda Fricker**, a professor of philosophy at New York University, will discuss these questions with novelist **Amanda Dennis**.

Ryback** details the remarkable story of Hitler's dismantling of democracy through democratic process and shares insights into Hitler's personal and professional lives, recounting backroom deals, unlikely alliances, stunning betrayals, an ill-timed tax audit, as well as a fateful weekend that changed our world forever.
