


<u>The Couple and the City with Ayşegül Savas and Chris Knapp</u> Hybrid: In-Person at the Library or Live on Zoom **Tuesday 10 September at 19h30 CEST** 

In their most recent novels, **Ayşegül Savas** and **Chris Knapp** both explore the loves, family dramas, and transnational relationships of young married couples. Savas' *The Anthropologists* follows the couple Asya and Manu in the midst of apartment-hunting in an unnamed city. In Knapp's *States of Emergency*, an American man and his French wife embark on a journey of fertility treatment during a catastrophic Parisian heatwaye.

**Ayşegül Savaş** is the author of the acclaimed novels *Walking on the Ceiling* and *White on White*. Her work has been translated into six languages and has appeared in the *New Yorker*, the *Paris Review, Granta*, and elsewhere. She lives in Paris.

**Chris Knapp**'s work has appeared in the *Paris Review*, *n+1*, *Granta*, and the *New England Review*, among others. He earned an MFA in fiction at the University of Virginia, and an MA in journalism and international affairs from SciencesPo in Paris. *States of Emergency* is his first novel.




## <u>Can Women Be Ruthless Criminals? with Ivy Pochoda and</u> Katherine Pancol

Ivy Pochoda and Katherine Pancol discuss Pochoda's latest thriller, *Sing Her Down*, a disastrous game of cat-and-mouse between a prisoner and her former cellmate. Is Florence "Florida" Baum a naive victim of circumstance, or a ruthless criminal? While Florida convinces herself she is the unlucky target of manipulation, Diosmary Sandoval knows a truth that Florida refuses to believe: that women are capable of immeasurable cruelty.




## Populism in 2024




#### On Breathing with Jamieson Webster

Psychoanalyst **Jamieson Webster** discusses her forthcoming book *On Breathing: Care in a Time of Catastrophe*. The one thing that unites every single moment of our lives is that we are breathing. Although inhaling and exhaling rarely attract attention, these simple actions are increasingly under threat — whether due to climate change, anxiety, or a public health emergency. Webster draws on her professional experience as a palliative care psychoanalyst during the pandemic, as well her personal experiences, to explore this often overlooked subject. The conversation will be moderated by writer, journalist and psychoanalyst **Sinziana Ravini**.




## Imperfect Life in a Perfect City: The Paris of Today

Journalist **Simon Kuper** discusses his new memoir, *Impossible City: Paris in the Twenty-First Century*, with fellow journalist **Pamela Druckerman**. In more than twenty years living in Paris, Kuper has experienced the city as both a human being and a journalist. He has enjoyed croissants, taken his children to youth soccer in the *banlieues* and has watched Paris—and himself—change through terrorist attacks, heatwaves, protests, the Covid pandemic and the Olympics. His memoir mixes personal observations with reportage on the evolution of one of the world's great cities.

For the first *Entre Nous* event of the *rentrée*, the American Library in Paris and the Institute for Ideas and Imagination will host at Reid Hall a conversation between two of the greatest contemporary literary voices: Colm Tóibín and Guadalupe Nettel, on the occasion of the French publication of Tóibín's latest novel, *Long Island*. The book tells the story of Eilis Lacey—the complex and enigmatic heroine of *Brooklyn*, one of Tóibín's most acclaimed books—twenty years later, in a moving and tense story of secrecy, misunderstanding, and love.



## Critical Conversations 2024-25: The Internet Is Not What You Think

What is the internet? How far back in history can we find its precursors, in the form either of mechanical social, or perhaps even biological information networks? In this year's season of Critical Conversations, historian and philosopher Justin Smith-Ruiu will lead us through conversations to understanding the unprecedented technological revolution we are currently living through, as well as its economic, political, cultural, and psychological consequences.

## **About the series leader:**

Justin Smith-Ruiu is a historian and philosopher of science. A professor at the University of Paris, Smith-Ruiu is the author of *Irrationality: A History of the Dark Side of Reason* (2019), *The Philosopher: A History in Six Types* (2016), and *Divine Machines: Leibniz and the Sciences of Life* (2011).

The 2024–2025 series will unfold over eight sessions, on Thursdays from October 2024 to June 2025. Advance registration is required.
