Board of Trustees Welcome Five New Members

The Annual General Meeting of the American Library in Paris, Inc. was held on 20 June. Chairman of the Board of Trustees Forrest Alogna, Vice-Chairman William Kelly, and Library Executive Director Audrey Chapuis reported on the organization's activities in 2022. Five new Trustees were elected to their first terms on the Board, starting in June 2023:

Damon L. Austin has been a career librarian and library information consultant for more than two decades. His diverse background includes work with academic, special, and school libraries. Mr. Austin received his Master of Library and Information Science (MLIS) degree from the University of South Florida and has presented at numerous professional conferences and research centers discussing the future of libraries, their impact on American culture, and technology access solutions. He began visiting Paris two decades prior to his recent tenure as the American Library Association (ALA) Representative to the American Library in Paris's Board of Trustees (2018–2022).

Nathalie Hobbs is a former Asia Managing Partner and banking lawyer at Linklaters, a major global law firm. After retiring from her law career, she returned to Paris, where she lived for twenty years before moving to Hong Kong. She is currently studying for a masters degree in Heritage Management (she completed her undergraduate degree at Oxford), as well as consulting for an NGO in Africa.

Steve Mertz is a Trustee of the National Film and Television School Foundation and of the Architectural Association School of Architecture, both in London. Until 2021 Steve headed up the Legal and Business Affairs Department for Warner Bros., where he was General Counsel, Senior Vice-President and Corporate Compliance Officer for Europe, the Middle East, and Africa. He graduated from Stanford University (having studied in Paris at Sciences Po), then attended the USC School of Law. He worked as a corporate lawyer in California before moving to London in 1988.

Alison Pearsall is a senior in-house counsel who advises large multi-national companies on high value/risk disputes in the energy and water sectors. Prior to her in-house career, she worked as an attorney at law firms in New York and Paris, specializing in international arbitration and complex commercial litigation. She has previously held non-executive director positions in the non-profit sector. Alison attended Columbia College and holds graduate degrees from both Columbia University and the University of Washington.

Audrey Rohan is a corporate and securities lawyer with over thirty years experience in private practice as both a partner in New York City law firms and as General Counsel of the US division of a multinational consumer products corporation. Audrey earned a JD from the University of Texas Law School and a BS in Economics (Accounting) from the Wharton School of the University of Pennsylvania. Since arriving in France in 2011, Audrey has earned a DSU from Paris 2 – Panthéon-Assas Law School in the area of business law. She currently teaches master level corporate and finance law courses at the Sciences Po Law School and at its School of Management and Impact.

Also during the Annual General Meeting, two incumbent trustees, Julien Horn and Cédric Sellin, were reelected to three-year terms. Heather Keane, Elizabeth Oger-Gross, and George Stansfield, who completed their service to the Board in June 2023, were thanked for their service by Chairman Alogna and Vice-Chairman Kelly.

Alogna, Kelly, and Secretary Andrew Plump will continue in their current roles. Trustee Jill Le Grand was appointed Treasurer, and Trustee Steve Horton will serve as Assistant Treasurer.

Final Programs of the Season



It might be easy to conclude that the heroines of classical literature have nothing to teach us about the capacity to say "no." In *Au NON des femmes*, Jennifer Tamas demonstrates how the women of the *Grand Siècle* resisted, disobeyed, and fought against a patriarchal society. Offering a new way of reading classical texts, Tamas liberates the women of literature from the masculine gaze which has falsely rendered them submissive.



The Inquisitor's Tale with Adam Gidwitz



Critical Conversations Meeting Nine: Freedom and Civility




Finding the Raga with Amit Chaudhuri


