## **Introducing the 2024 Book Award Jury**

The jury for the 2024 American Library in Paris Book Award, now in its twelfth year, has been selected. The distinguished writers who will be choosing this year's winning title are:



#### **Andrew Sean Greer (Jury Chair)**

Andrew Sean Greer is the Pulitzer Prize-winning author of seven works of fiction, including the bestsellers *The Confessions of Max Tivoli* and *Less; The Story of a Marriage; The Impossible Lives of Greta Wells*; and *Less is Lost.* He edited the anthology *The Best American Short Stories 2022*. Greer has taught at a number of universities, including the Iowa Writers Workshop, been a TODAY show pick, a New York Public Library Cullman Center Fellow, a judge for the National Book Award, and a winner of the California Book Award and the New York Public Library Young Lions Award. He is the recipient of a NEA grant, a Guggenheim Fellowship, and the 2018 Pulitzer Prize for Fiction.

#### **Ayelet Waldman**

Ayelet Waldman is the author of A Really Good Day, the novels Love and Treasure, Red Hook Road, Love and Other Impossible Pursuits, and Daughter's Keeper, as well as of the essay collection Bad Mother: A Chronicle of Maternal Crimes, Minor Calamities, and Occasional Moments of Grace. She edited the anthologies Kingdom of Olives and Ash: Writers Confront the Occupation, Fight of the Century, and In This Place, Not of It: Narratives from Women's Prisons. She is a co-creator of the award-winning Netflix television series Unbelievable.



#### Jonas Hassen Khemiri

Jonas Hassen Khemiri is an award-winning Swedish author, playwright, and poet. His novels, which have been translated into over thirty languages, include *One Eye Red, Montecore: The Silence of the Tiger, I Call My Brothers, The Family Clause* and *The Sisters.* Khemiri's fourth novel, *Everything I Don't Remember*, received the August Prize, Sweden's highest literary honor. His six plays have been performed by over 100 international theater companies. He currently teaches in the creative writing program at NYU.


Hybrid Event: In Person at the Library; Live on Zoom Tuesday 30 April at 19h30 CEST

French author Annie Ernaux, winner of the 2022 Nobel Prize for Literature, writes of her desire to "describe reality as through the eyes of a photographer and to preserve the mystery and opacity of the lives I encountered."

Curator Lou Stoppard's exhibition "Exteriors—Annie Ernaux & Photography" (at La Maison européenne de la photographie, now through 26 May) traces this close relationship between Ernaux's autobiographical prose and the medium of photography. Stoppard will appear in conversation with writer and journalist Lauren Collins.

The program is produced in collaboration with la Maison européenne de la photographie and art book publisher MACK, which has released a book accompanying the exhibition.


### <u>The Anatomy of Privilege: Nick McDonell on Quiet Street</u> Hybrid Event: In Person at the Library; Live on Zoom Thursday 2 May at 19h30 CEST

Nick McDonell has written eleven books, ranging from novels (the first of which he wrote at the age of seventeen) to nonfiction accounts of the wars in Iraq and Afghanistan. With his latest, a memoir called *Quiet Street*, McDonell turns his gaze inward to his own wealthy New York upbringing. He considers his private all-boys school in Manhattan, his time as a student at Harvard, and his summers at the Devon Yacht Club.

McDonell uses his own life as a prism through which to understand larger dynamics of class, race, and inequality. He will appear in conversation at the Library with photographer and filmmaker Roopa Gogineni.

#### The Examined Life with Scott Hershovitz and Sarah Bakewell



Special note: Doors will open at 19h00, and the event will be followed by a reception. (Please be aware that the Library facility is closed during the day for the Ascension holiday.)



In his latest book, Law is a Moral Practice, the author approaches the relationship between moral action and the law with refreshing frankness and levity, uncovering a very human history of setting, breaking, and remaking rules for good living.

Sarah Bakewell's work is similarly engaged with the idea of ethical living. Her latest book, *Humanly Possible*, masterfully recounts the long history of humanism and freethinking. Join these two professional philosophers to discuss the big questions of life: the nature of goodness, the possibility of ethical living, and the meaning of being human.


The Art of Biography with Stacy Schiff

#### Warming Up with Madeleine Orr


Hybrid Event: In Person at the Library; Live on Zoom Wednesday 15 May at 19h30 CEST

Tuesday 21 May at 18h00 CEST



# The Forgotten Soldiers of D-Day with Linda Hervieux and Raymond Kemp

As we approach the 80th anniversary of D-Day, join the author of *Forgotten: The Untold Story of D-Day's Black Heroes*, Linda Hervieux, and Commissioner of the American Battle Monuments Commission Raymond Kemp as they discuss the achievements of the more than one million African American men and women who served in uniform during World War II.
